## HELLO ISRAEL

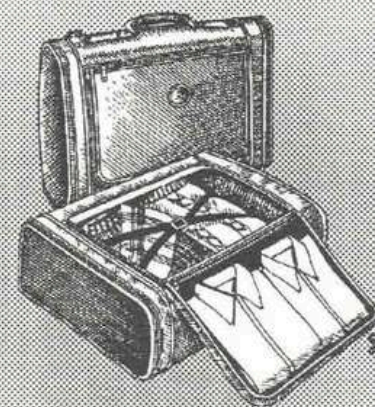
Now, more than ever, it is important to communicate what a wonderful country Israel is and to share information about its people, culture and history.

# CCVI Scholarship Award

**F**ifty-eight years ago, my mom, Beth Lyon, and a few of her friends who belonged to National Council of Jewish Women in Kansas City recognized the need to help the visually impaired.

Ever since, NCJW has sponsored Parties for the Blind with the continued involvement and support of my mother and other NCJW members.

CCVI was a natural extension of my mother's interests.

In her later years (she was already in her 80's), she volunteered as an assistant in Ala's Friday kindergarten class where her great joy was to read to the children.

Her own five grandchildren and nine great grandchildren called her Oma Beth, a sweet and loving German word for grandmother, but here the children called her Gramma Beth maybe because she seemed like their own grandmas.

Our Beth passed away four years ago, but she left a fund to NCJW in hopes that the organization would be able to continue her interest in the visually impaired.

The NCJW Board of Directors chose to use some of that money to provide scholarships over the next five years to help one child a year attend CCVI.

Oma Beth would be thrilled with that choice and so are we all.

This year's recipient is two and one half year old Austin Parsons, NCJW is very happy to help make it possible for

## 2002 – 2003 SCHOLARSHIP WINNERS

### ***Feld/Bograd Scholarship Winners***

The Selma and Milton Feld Memorial Scholarship was established in 1984. Later a generous bequest from the estate of the late Abe Bograd was added to the scholarship to enable NCJW to help more people. The Scholarship Committee earmarked these funds for women over 35 in college or graduate school in the Greater Kansas City area. Grants are based on need and the applicant's potential. Many women who are finishing an interrupted education, who need to raise their status in life to support themselves and families or who desire a more meaningful career have been able to reach their goals through these funds.

**Glenda Gochenour** – Glenda is a 40 year old married mother of three attending UMKC and working on her Master's Degree in Social Work. She works full time in addition to her class work and intends to finish her degree in May, 2003. Her career goals include making a difference in the lives of the elderly. She maintains a 3.6 grade point average. She received the \$2,500 Feld Scholarship.

**Hazel Franklin** – Hazel is a 38 year old married mother of three working toward a Bachelor's Degree in Political Science at UMKC. She hopes to finish her class work in two years. Her career goals include promoting issues that support the nation's welfare and those affecting international relations. She hopes to work with all levels of government; local, state, and national. She maintained a 3.6 grade point average at Penn Valley Community College prior to being admitted to UMKC. She received the \$1,000 Bograd Scholarship.

**Geraldine Hawkins** – Geraldine is a 54 year old divorced mother of 4 grown children. She is working towards a Bachelor of Liberal Arts Degree and then plans to apply for a Master's program in Social Work or Education at UMKC. Geraldine was forced to withdraw from high school at age fourteen and was basically on her own. She always had a dream of completing a degree program after earning her GED at age 28. She works full time and would like to give back to the community which helped her by helping children who have been physically and sexually abused. She maintains a 2.5 grade point average. She received the \$2,500 Bograd Scholarship.

### ***Flarsheim Fellowship Recipient***

Louis Flarsheim was the grandson of the founder of the Kansas City Section, Bertha Lieberman. It was after her death in 1933 that the Section's Scholarship Program was established in her memory. Mr. Flarsheim maintained his interest in the program throughout his lifetime and contributed to it regularly. At the time of his death, he left a bequest to the Scholarship Program. It was with this funding that the Flarsheim Fellowship was established to be awarded to a Jewish woman younger than 35 entering her first year of graduate school as a full-time student.

**Carly Farbman** – Carly graduated from Indiana University in May of 2002 with a Bachelors Degree in Mathematics. During her collegiate career, she was inducted into several honor societies. Carly was also very active in philanthropic activities and intramural sports. She is enrolled in the Masters of Profession Accountancy Program at the Kelly School of Business. Carly received \$1,500.

Tara came into the court system when she was nine years old, along with three other siblings. Her home life at that point was dismal - incidents of abuse, neglect and molestation occurred frequently. Her mother, a drug abuser who was under court jurisdiction, was scheduled for a drug test, knew she would fail, and fled to another state leaving the children alone. They were initially placed in the care of relatives, but this only perpetuated the abuse cycle.

Tara's mother's parental rights were terminated when she was 10. All of the children were separated. Tara was placed in numerous foster homes, group homes and hospitals for the next five years.

In February of 2000, Tara ran away from her foster home. She used her older sister's identification to enroll in school, get a job and access the Free Health Clinic. She told everyone that she was 19. She had given up on the system and was trying to take care of herself, although she made many mistakes in judgment. She was identified and picked up by the KCMO police the day before Thanksgiving 2000, placed in detention and remanded to the court's custody once again. She was angry, depressed and disheveled in every way.

Jackson County CASA attorney, Deb Greenburg Baron, was asked to be the Guardian Ad Litem for Tara, and along with staff and a CASA volunteer, formed a powerful advocacy team for this young girl.

Tara was placed in a group facility where she was able to complete the 8th grade. Her health and behavior stabilized and she began believing in herself again. Her situation was monitored closely by Jackson County CASA and she was able to have outings with a caring adult mentor.

Although there have been many ups and downs in the last two years, Tara has managed to form positive relationships, regain trust in adults and actually reside in a home with a stabilizing foster family for several months. With strong CASA advocacy, Tara has continued positive progress with her DFS Case Worker and has gained the ability to identify and appropriately seek and ask for what she needs. She is now also able to have regular contact with her younger sister, occasionally speaks with her young brother, who is now adopted, and her older sister, who has a baby of her own.

Tara came to the attention of National Council of Jewish Women, Greater Kansas City Section, through her CASA volunteer. NCJW generously provided Tara with luggage and clothing in order to begin the new chapter of her life at Job Corps, where she moved on her 17th birthday. Tara hopes to be a successful cosmetologist and learn carpentry skills as a result of her favorite home improvement show "Trading Spaces" through the Job Corps.

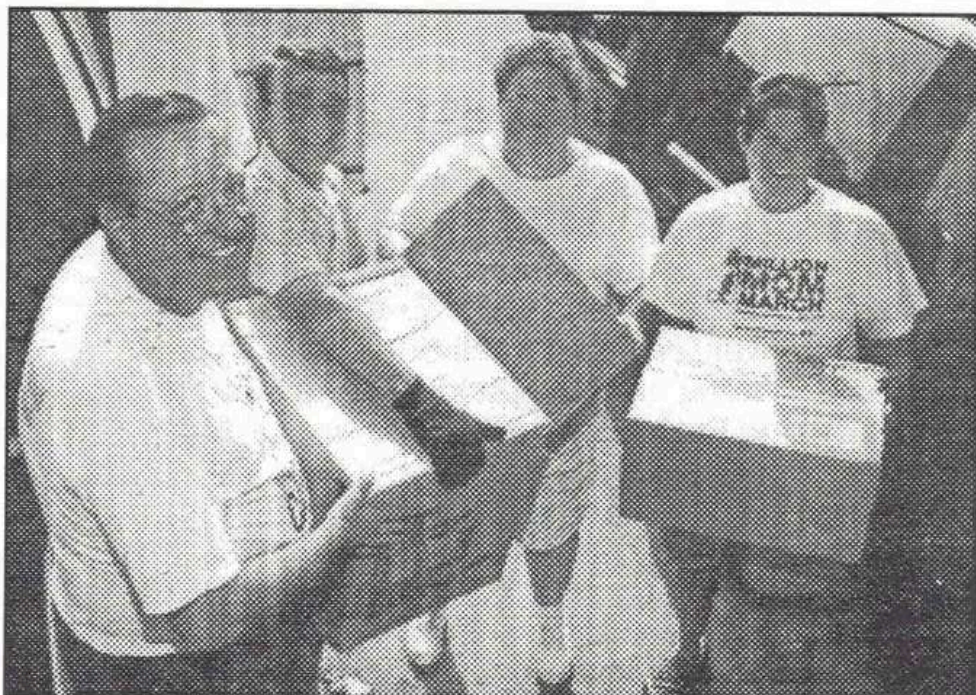

# SAFEHOME

SAFEHOME'S Mission is to break the cycle of sexual and domestic violence and abuse.

When people volunteer, they choose an area of interest, or an area where they have a vested interest. NCJW appealed to me 20 some years ago because of its priorities. I felt comfortable advocating for them, and met a wonderful group of women through many projects and years of active involvement. I felt challenged and comfortable.

As I interview people for SAFEHOME volunteers, I always ask if there are domestic violence issues in their past, either with friends, extended family, or themselves. In order to be an effective volunteer and have any contact with residents/clients, you must feel comfortable. One woman's answer surprised me this week and made me extremely grateful that NCJW sponsors the Silent Witness Program through SAFEHOME. She told me she and her daughter attended church two or three years ago and happened upon the Silent Witness Exhibit in the foyer. They separately walked around reading the breast plates, then met and headed for the sanctuary and the Sunday morning service. At one point during the service the daughter whispered in her mother's ear, "At least Dad hasn't killed us." That statement made this potential volunteer know she needed to take action. She went to her minister who referred her to SAFEHOME. After going through counseling, leaving her husband, and

trying to get their lives back to "normal," they came to me asking how they can volunteer for SAFEHOME.

Listening to her I knew the Silent Witness Exhibit helped them escape their abusive situation. Did it save their lives? I don't know, but it helped them get their lives on track and now they live in a safe environment. Think how many other women this exhibit influenced and impacted in the four years NCJW has sponsored it. After she left, I sat thinking of my connection between NCJW and SAFEHOME. It almost seemed "beshert" that I should work for SAFEHOME, who enjoys a wonderful partnership with NCJW!

In Judaism we grow up learning a basic Jewish tenet, if you can save one life, it's as if you have saved the whole world.

This week I felt that NCJW and SAFEHOME exemplified that value.

I wish everyone a healthy, safe, peaceful, and joyous L'shannah Tova!

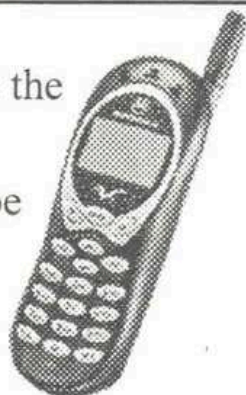

Karen – On December 18, 1998, Karen and her boyfriend of six months, Brad, went partying. There was a dispute and Karen found a ride home by herself. When Brad arrived, he began to beat her. The neighbor called the police. On December 21<sup>st</sup>, Karen was found to be unresponsive; her daughter called 911 and the med techs worked on her, but she did not respond. Karen had slowly bled to death from a ruptured spleen from being kicked by Brad. Her ribs were broken and her head and body were severely bruised. Her boyfriend was found guilty of Second Degree Murder-Unintentional-and sentenced to 146 months.

**H**elp us "GET OUT THE VOTE"!!!! NCJW Members MUST be ADVOCATES in getting "18" year olds and "over" to vote on or before November 5th in Kansas and Missouri! We have very important races in both states and we NEED YOUR HELP! Included in this Bulletin is a separate page with the same message. This is a form to request an advance ballot in Kansas. It must be filled out and returned to the election office (by car, by mail or by fax) in order for you to receive a ballot to vote in advance of the elections. You can copy this form and use it for another member of the family or a close friend. If you live in Missouri, please solicit your friends and family members who

live in Kansas! Copy them and hand them out personally! Remember your children who are 18 and older, or will be 18 before November 5th, even someone in assisted living, or moving to Kansas before the elections! I urge you to take this request very seriously, even if you will be in town. It is very important to "get out the vote" with such an easy vehicle as the advance ballot. Please begin to fill out the forms now, they can be filled out and sent in now so that the ballots will be mailed to you on October 16th the first day of advance voting. The last day to REGISTER to vote is Monday, **October 21<sup>st</sup>** in case you (or someone you know) is not registered! The last day to advance vote is Monday, Noon,

November 4th, the day before the elections. For any questions, to find out how to vote advance "in person, on a machine", or to help register a "Kansan" call **913-782-3441**. In Missouri, the phone number for the Election Board is **816-842-4820**.

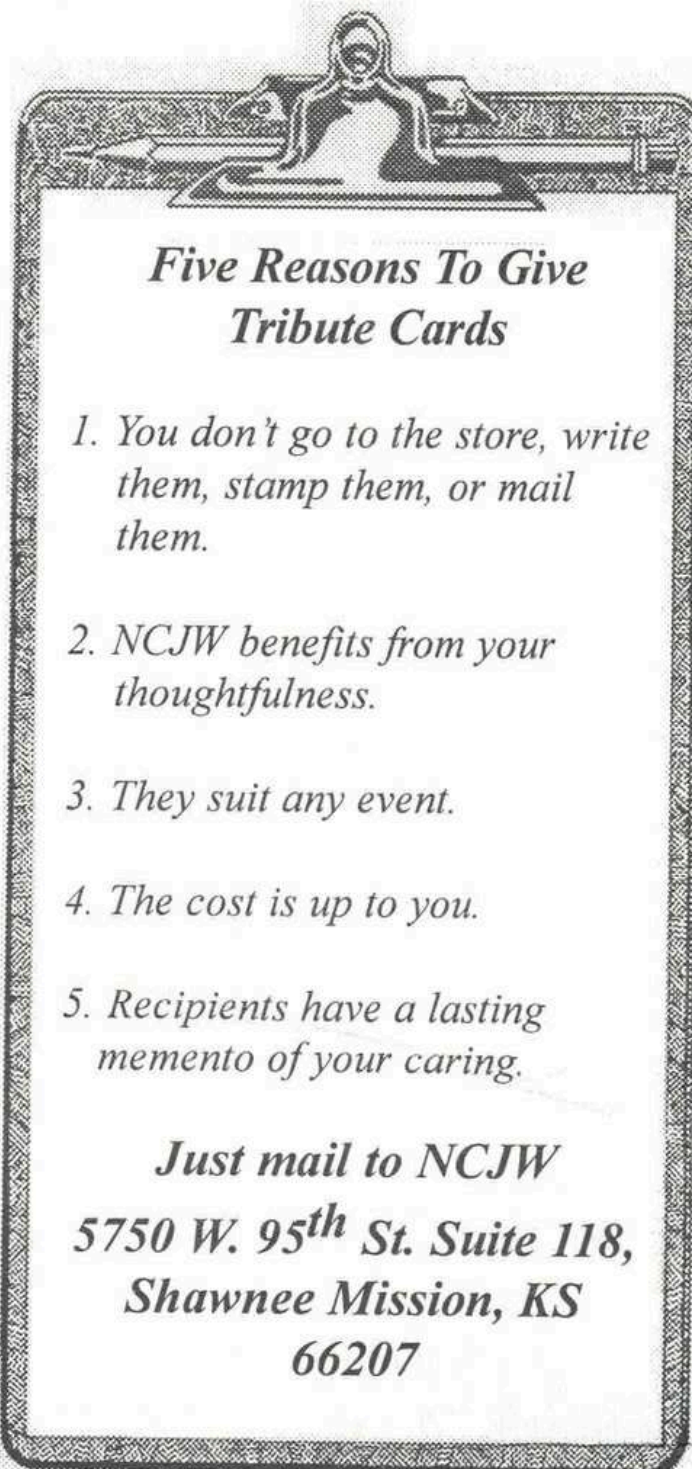
