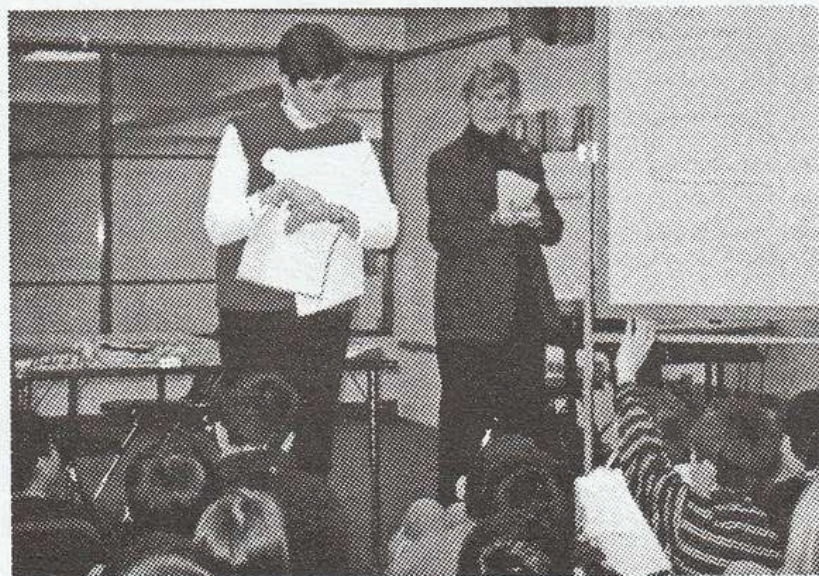

# ***Energetic Volunteers Wanted for Local Section Community Service Projects***

## **Kids and Teachers=School (KATS)**

The *KATS* project is the adoption of M. E. Pearson Elementary School in Kansas City, KS. NCJW does birthday parties once a month; the *Angel Project*, the adoption of a student for the holidays; and will be adding a tutor/mentoring program in the Fall. Members also donate school supplies, books, new underwear and used children's clothes.

## **Hello Israel Presentation**

A curriculum enrichment activity for sixth grade social studies classes presented by trained NCJW members in the Greater Kansas City area. The goal is to provide knowledge and understanding about the State of Israel in a secular and non-political setting. Presentations of 1 1/2 hours are done with a partner.

## **Parties for the Blind**

Six times a year, volunteers provide a lunch, entertainment and transportation for the visually impaired. This is the Greater Kansas City Section's oldest on-going program.

## **Domestic Violence/ Silent Witness Exhibit**

Silent Witness is a traveling exhibit which honors women who have died in Kansas as a result of domestic violence. We also have a Metropolitan Kansas City Exhibit. Each exhibit includes 12 red life-size silhouettes with biographical information on each woman it represents. The two exhibits are sponsored in conjunction with *Safehome, Newhouse*, the *Johnson County Domestic Violence Shelter*, and the *Kansas Coalition Against Sexual and Domestic Violence*. Information and speakers on domestic violence are provided as part of this program. Other domestic violence projects are taken on.

## **HopeLine**

A used cell phone collection in collaboration with *Verizon Wireless* where the phones are refurbished and programmed with 911 and distributed to domestic violence shelters. Those phones which cannot be refurbished are sold and the money put into a fund for domestic violence programs to obtain funds.

## **Luggage for Freedom**

So that women and children can leave domestic violence shelters with dignity, we are collecting used luggage.

## **Women Helping Women**

A program where women can donate clothes that will be given to women in domestic shelters who are returning to the work force. This is usually done as part of a luncheon/fashion show/program.

## **Scholarships**

Scholarships are offered to needy undergraduate and graduate students who demonstrate academic excellence and financial need. These students must reside within four area school districts: Kansas City, Center, Shawnee Mission and Blue Valley. In addition, several scholarships are offered each year to women who want to return to school.

## **Thriftique**

A sale of designer, new, nearly new and gently worn clothes and household items is held yearly.

## **Operation Clothe Me**

On the last day of *Thriftique*, social service agencies are invited to send clients to receive free merchandise.

## **Bridge**

Two bridge groups are available for members - women and couples. These groups play monthly and donate their proceeds to the section.

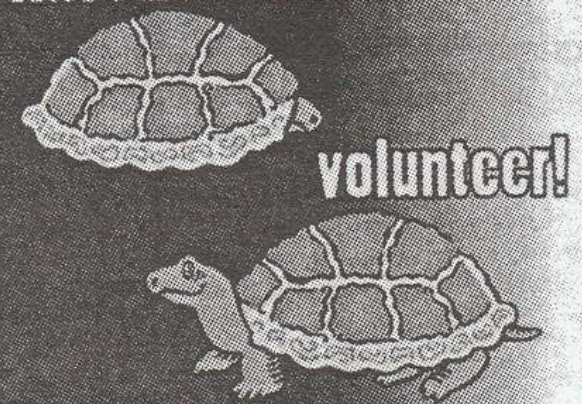
## **Advocacy Education**

## *The Advocacy in Action Award to the Greater Kansas City Section*

In honor of the Sections' pursuit of the NCJW mission through extraordinary advocacy of a community action or issue on the local, state or national level, NCJW presented to the Greater Kansas City Section the *Advocacy in Action Award*.

NCJW, Greater Kansas City Section submitted the year of gun control advocacy that began in September, 2000 with Mary Leigh Blek, Million Mom March President, speaking at the Fall Meeting. We continued in February, 2001 with a Silent March to Topeka with students from Shawnee Mission East High School where shoes representing the children killed by guns was presented to the Judiciary Committee and testimony was given. We proceeded to watch for legislation and kept our members abreast of what was going on in gun issues. In May of 2001, we mailed the sensible gun laws pins and asked our members to wear them during Mother's Day weekend and through the week that the National Rifle Association met in Kansas City.

### *Betty Barnett To Receive Hannah G. Solomon Award*

National Council of Jewish Women is proud to bestow its most prestigious honor, the Hannah G. Solomon Award, to Betty Barnett. The Hannah G. Solomon Award was developed to honor and commemorate the founder of the organization over 100 years ago. This award is given to an individual based upon nominations received from the membership of the Greater Kansas City Section of NCJW. Betty Barnett personifies the tireless efforts of our founder, Hannah G. Solomon by her long-standing devotion and commitment to significant NCJW community service programs.

Betty is a native Kansas Citian. She has been a member of NCJW since 1949, following in the footsteps of her mother, Beth Lyons, and her grandmother, Anna Lyons. Betty was involved in the formation of the first CASA project (Court-Appointed Special Advocates) in Jackson County, Missouri and served as a CASA for 5 years. The CASA project earned NCJW national recognition and was duplicated in many communities across the nation. From 1989 to 1994, Betty expanded her work with CASA and became the Johnson County, Kansas CASA chairperson for NCJW. During that tenure, Betty worked on child-in-need-of-care cases, and was asked by the Court to work on divorce custody cases, as well as supervised visitation. All of these programs continue today. Currently, Betty continues to serve on the Johnson County CASA Board. During Betty's many years of service on the NCJW Board, Betty was instrumental in the award of start-up money to the Kansas Children's Service League Healthy Families Project, now called Healthy Families Olathe. She is currently the Chairman of the Advisory Task Force for Healthy Families Olathe. She has served on the NCJW Emelie Levin Committee awarding grants for worthwhile community service projects.

6 Betty has also been instrumental in carrying out the wishes of her mother, Beth Lyons, through a bequest given to NCJW for Parties for the Blind, an ongoing community service project for the past 65 years, that provides services for the visually disabled in the Greater Kansas City Community. Daughter Lynn, daughter-in-law Carol, and niece Pat Brown are all Life Members of NCJW, carrying on the family tradition! Betty proudly acknowledges that she has been a member of the NCJW Friday Study Group for 47 years.

The Greater Kansas City Section is proud to recognize Betty Barnett with the Hannah G. Solomon Award.

### *Service to Section Award to be Presented to Gloria Goodfriend*

In order to be eligible to receive this award, the honoree must be a member of NCJW for a minimum of thirty (30) years. She must also be currently involved in one or more Section activities and must have demonstrated continuous service in furthering the goals of the organization and support for its programs. The National Council of Jewish Women, Greater Kansas City Section is proud to honor Gloria Goodfriend with the national "Service to Section Award."

The Service to Section award has stringent criteria for qualification. Yet Gloria Goodfriend meets all of those requirements and more. Gloria is a native of Dallas, Texas and grew up in New York City. She attended Columbia University. When she came for a visit to Kansas City, she met and later married her husband, M. Robert Goodfriend, and made Kansas City her permanent home. Gloria became a member of NCJW over 40 years ago. During that time she also served on the staff of the Jewish Community Center as Director of Cultural Arts Programs, including the famous American Poets Series. After raising her family, Gloria reached a long held goal and completed her degree at UMKC. She went on to receive a Master's Degree in Liberal Arts from Baker University.

During Gloria's tenure in NCJW, she served as President of the Greater Kansas City Section from 1971-73. She fondly recalls hosting the Second Central District Convention in Kansas City when she served on the Central District Board. She continued to serve as a member of the Board of the Greater Kansas City Section for many years. Gloria has worked, with and continues to work with, Parties for the Blind. She has provided public relations services for the Section and also served as its Executive Director. During Gloria's long years of service to NCJW, the organization sponsored a day care center near Menorah Medical Center and cosponsored the development of the Danciger Judaic Studies Program at UMKC. She supported the organization in reaching out to serve the needs of the community, especially older adults and transportation services. She is proud of NCJW's ability to meet the changing needs of the community.

For the many years of devoted effort Gloria has given to NCJW, she is being honored with the Service to Section Award.



## *Paulette Giarratana and Barbara Warady to Receive the Emerging Leader Award*

The purpose of the Emerging Leader Award is to recognize an individual who has demonstrated commitment to the Section, support for the NCJW mission and programs, while serving on the Section Board or as an officer, and has the potential for assuming future Section leadership. Paulette and Barbara follow a long line of outstanding women who have had this national award bestowed upon them by their Section. The National Council of Jewish Women, Greater Kansas City Section is proud to present national awards for Emerging Leaders to Paulette Giarratana and Barbara Warady.

### *Paulette Giarratana*

Paulette Giarratana is a native of Hackensack, New Jersey who came to Kansas City with her husband, Arthur Chaykin and 2 sons, Ben and Zack, in 1987. Paulette has a law degree from Northern Illinois University in DeKalb. She has been a board member of NCJW since 1999. For the past two years, Paulette has successfully chaired the Stay-At-Home Ball, a mainstay fundraising event for NCJW. She has also served as Corporate Secretary for the past two years, utilizing her excellent organizational skills in the successful administration of the organization. Her consistent presence in documenting and promoting the work of the Section has been invaluable as NCJW strives to improve the lives of women, children and families in a broad range of areas. Paulette attended the NCJW Leadership Development Institute in Dallas as a representative of the Kansas City Section.

In the Kansas City Community, Paulette has served as President of Leawood Elementary School PTO. She is a member of Congregation Beth Torah and currently serves as co-chairman of the K'Sharim (Caring) Committee assisting members in times of personal and family need. Paulette's creativity and organizational skills have earned her the honor of receiving the National Council of Jewish Women's Emerging Leader Award.

### *Barbara Warady*

Barbara Warady is a native of Chicago, Illinois and came to Kansas City in 1979 with her husband Dr. Bradley Warady. They have three children, Stacy, Melanie and Michael. Barbara became a member of NCJW in 1999 and has served on the Board since that time as Financial Secretary. Barbara's interest in advocacy issues led her to service as an officer of NCJW. She attended the triennial NCJW National Washington Institute, visiting Representatives and Senators on Capitol Hill, working on NCJW advocacy issues to curb domestic violence, promote affordable child care, legislate gun safety regulations, as well as promote support for families in Israel. Barbara has also devoted her time toward membership recruitment in an effort to enlist young leaders to carry on the NCJW mission. Barbara is a dietitian by training and teaches nutrition at Avila College. She has worked at KU Medical Center and is in her own private practice. Barbara and her family are members of Congregation Beth Torah. Barbara's enthusiasm and dedication to participation in NCJW advocacy projects as well as her efforts to attract the NCJW leaders of tomorrow have earned her the recognition of an NCJW Emerging Leader Award.

## *Jennie Levitt Leadership Award to Rosanne Rosen*

The Jennie Levitt Leadership Award is given by the Greater Kansas City Section of the National Council of Jewish Women to an individual who is currently active in the Section and has demonstrated commitment and leadership in the organization. The award is made possible by a gift from the family of Jennie D. Levitt, in her memory. The Section is proud to honor Rosanne Rosen.

Rosanne is a native of Kansas City. She is married to Dr. Howard Rosen and has been a member of NCJW for the past 10 years. During that time, Rosanne served as the editor of the NCJW *Bulletin* for 3 years. Rosanne's outstanding work as *Bulletin* editor resulted in the Section receiving national recognition at the NCJW National Convention in 1999. Rosanne also assisted with membership recruitment and helped to develop the NCJW brochure outlining the NCJW mission, goals and diverse programs. She has also served on the Nominating Committee.

Rosanne is particularly proud of the work NCJW does on behalf of abused women, and domestic violence, as demonstrated by the Silent Witness program. She is supportive of the various NCJW scholarship programs, helping people to realize their life goals. Rosanne attended Drake University and received a degree in journalism. She has worked for People to People International since 1978, an organization established by Dwight Eisenhower to promote world peace and mutual understanding, and she currently serves as Vice-President of Operations. Rosanne has successfully combined her professional pursuits with her volunteer efforts through NCJW toward making a difference in peoples' lives and for that reason, she is being recognized with the Jennie Levitt Award.



# Thanks, NCJW, For KATS Successful First Year

**K**ids and Teachers=School (KATS) began it's first year last May with no budget and the support of a small committee of NCJW members. Through the generosity of the NCJW membership and our Shawnee Mission High School partners, we have been able to accomplish more than we thought possible in the first year. We participated last summer in the first ever Back To School Fair in Kansas City, KS donating a flat of school supplies for the event. Over 3000 children received school supplies in the Kansas City, Kansas District that day. The turnout was incredible. Along with school supplies for the fair and for M. E. Pearson, our members have donated money and books for the Birthday Party project. High school students from Shawnee Mission East High School gave a party for the children with birthdays in

each month at M. E. Pearson. Each child received a book, a cupcake, stickers and special time at lunch with the high school students. This worked out to be a wonderful partnership and will continue next year. The Angel Project, a winter holiday gift giving event, provided gifts to every student in the school. NCJW and students at Shawnee Mission Northwest were able to provide gifts for 183 students.

An anonymous donor gave over 6,000 children's books which were used by M. E. Pearson and three area middle schools. Books also were donated through the Hooked on Books program. NCJW was a recipient from Project Warmth which went to Pearson. We have provided used children's clothing and new underwear to students. Barbara Holzmark was able to help us get the Colgate-Palmolive Dental Van for screening the teeth of over half the

students in the school. NCJW members have been very generous with their time and money to make all of these projects successful.

We plan to continue as we have this year for the 2002-2003 school year. This summer we will be collecting money and donations of children's books (new or nearly new), schools supplies and new underwear, sizes 6-12, both boys and girls.

A special thank you to Ellen Dalen, who has done a fabulous job of helping us develop our partnerships with the high schools. Thank you again for making this first year of KATS at M. E. Pearson such a huge success. The teachers and students really do appreciate all we've done for them.

## Flarsheim Fellowship

The National Council of Jewish Women, Greater Kansas City Section is offering the Flarsheim Fellowship to be awarded to a Jewish woman entering her first year of graduate school as a full-time student. She must have been a resident of the Greater Kansas City area for the past 10 years, or a graduate of a Greater Kansas City area high school, or have immigrated from another country. She must be younger than 35 years. The \$2,000 Fellowship, which may be used at the university of the winner's choice, is an honorarium and is not based on financial need, but on academic achievement, character and purpose.
